Food for Seniors Guidelines

The Focus: HOPE Food for Seniors Program provides free monthly food to senior citizens who are 60 years of age or older and reside in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and Washtenaw counties. See the reverse side of this page for a listing of the food items and quantities which are distributed each month. Listed below are the income guidelines used to determine eligibility for the Focus: HOPE Food for Seniors Program.

If a senior meets the eligibility requirements as outlined above, he/she may be certified at any one of the Focus: HOPE Food Centers or at one of our many certification agencies in Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and Washtenaw counties. When a senior is certified at a food center, he/she is able to pick up his/her first month's food on that day.

In order to be certified, a senior must apply in person and bring the following:

1) proof of age, 2) identification, and 3) number of people in household.

Home delivery may be arranged for eligible seniors who are homebound or disabled. If you need transportation or have any other questions call **313.494.4980**.
